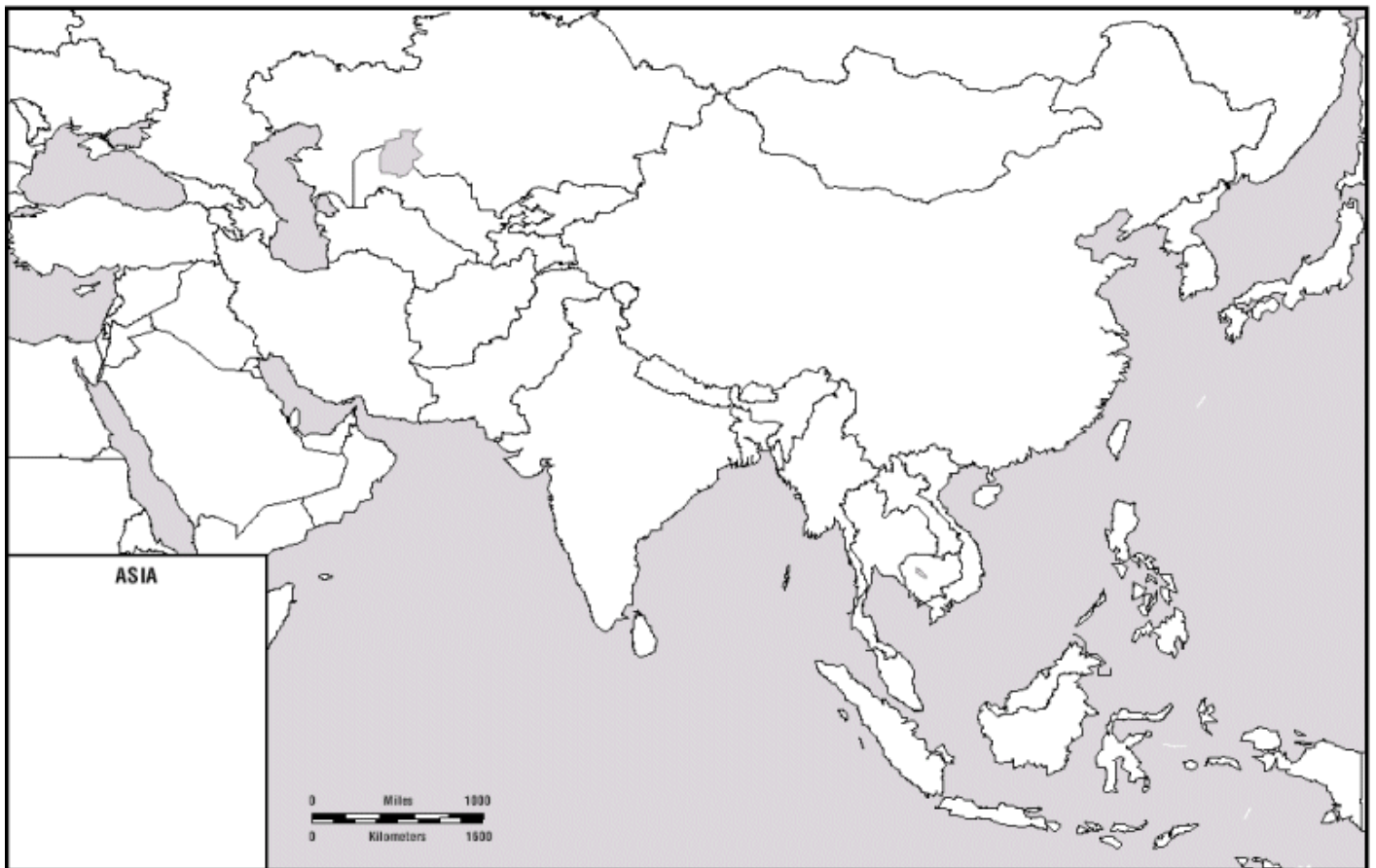

IMPERIALISM IN ASIA MAP



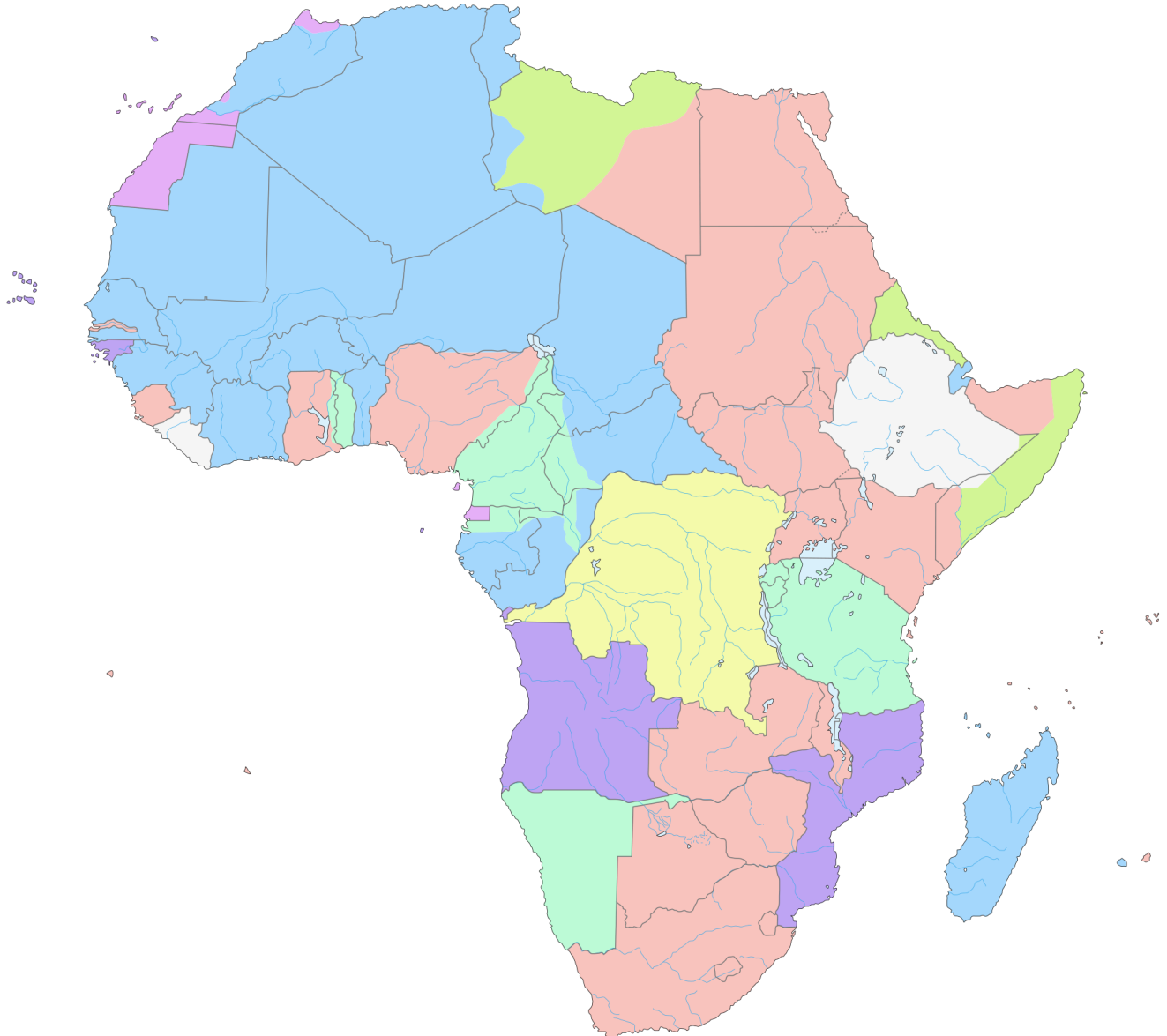
